Our community of users grew to more than 49,000 people in 214 countries around the globe. You're researchers, policy makers and influencers, students, publishers, and librarians—and we're so grateful that you were a part of our very first year.

Last year, the *Policy Commons* team...

...indexed more than 3 million publications

All are now poised to join the scholarly record, where they will be easier to find, cite, and catalog.

...covered more than 8,000 policy organizations

Our coverage quadrupled last year. Remember, you can ask us to add organizations—and our thanks to UCLA's Joseph Yue and University of Minnesota's Mary Schoenborn for recently recommending that we include Landmine and Cluster Munition Monitor and PharmacyChecker Research, respectively. Both organizations are now fully indexed.

...made African organizations and reports easy to discover

Our collection has grown to <u>69,000 items</u> drawn from the 814 African organizations in our directory.

inactive organizations

We continue to look for organizations that have closed their doors

...preserved 24,000 publications from 471
